














About Maz Evans


Fiction




Science inspired

He's making a Terrible Soup out of all of Billy and Fatcat's friends!



whole universe could unravel. Now Willow holds the fate of Starfell in her rather unremarkable hands . . . Can she save the day – by finding the lost one?


Non-Fiction







Librarian recommendations






Marinka dreams of a normal life, where her house stays in one place long enough for her to make friends. But her house has chicken legs and moves on without warning.
